our faculty, staff, community members, our caring donors, and collaborative partners who consistently engage with us to support student success and strong teaching and learning is to be praised.


Thank you for your commitment to PVCC and the value we bring to the community. Outstanding work is happening here so join us in telling everyone about how PVCC is working to move our community forward together.

community colleges. PVCC received this honor in 2013, 2015, 2017, 2019 and 2021.



Strategic Commitment Highlights

Ensure high levels of student success with equity and an excellent experience.

- Presenting at the Council of International Fellowship Cyprus conference on the impact the pandemic has on the practice dimension of social work in the United States, PVCC Faculty Stacy Moreno used the conference invitation as a project for her social work class.
- Career Services' job shadow program is connecting students with mentors versed in their chosen field of interest (FOI) and providing them with a variety of professional development training, tools, resources, guidance, programs, and opportunities in order to instill the knowledge, skills, and experience necessary to advance in their career trajectories.
- Engineering student Yarden Levy participated in the NASA Community College Aerospace Scholars (NCAS) program, a virtual program in which students are exposed to various areas of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM), and learn about NASA's missions and career opportunities.
- The inaugural Verizon Innovative Learning (VIL) Summer STEM Camp for 50 middle schoolers took place exposing them to a variety of science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) areas, including artificial intelligence, augmented reality, robotics, design thinking, and leadership development.

Strengthen our local economic and positive social change impact.

• PVCC attracted more than 400 in-person and virtual students to its third Entrepreneurship and Innovation Week.

- Arizona Sheriff Paul Penzone spoke at a PVCC community event about the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office's work with foster youth, human trafficking, hiring and training, and other issues facing Maricopa communities.
- PVCC collaborated with Achieving My Purpose a free eightweek wellness-driven program that provides programming, resources, and experience that empower women ages 18-30 to embrace and achieve their purpose.

Build a great workplace through organizational and operational effectiveness.

- After nearly two years of anticipation, PVCC opened the 6,900-square-foot Health Science building to house its expanding nursing program and paramedicine program.
- The American Association of Colleges and Universities invited a team from PVCC to participate in its annual Institute of ePortfolios program, which brings together educators from across the country to reflect on the evolving challenges that higher ed professionals encounter, learning new and innovative approaches to teaching.
- PVCC was named one of 14 community colleges nationwide to participate in the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) Cyber Skills for All: Community Colleges Lead the Way initiative. Funding was provided by the Microsoft Foundation.
- PVCC's Office of Strategic Partnerships expanded its partnership with Fresh Start Women's Foundation alliance, featuring additional programs at the college in the areas of Business, Entrepreneurialism and Management, Computer Information Technology, and Health Sciences.

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Fields of Interest (FOI)

Designated Fields of Interest (FOIs) organize degrees and certificates into categories that share similar areas of study, allowing students to identify skills and interests geared toward specific careers best for them.

















Our **2021-2022 All-USA Scholar recipients** were Jovana Vincic and Vala Zupko, who both demonstrated academic excellence and intellectual rigor combined with leadership and service that extends their education beyond the classroom to benefit society. PVCC's Honors Program pushes students to further develop critical thinking, communication and leadership skills, spawning opportunities through scholarships, field trips and full faculty immersion.

Alumni of the Year

PVCC recognized the many accomplishments for our 2022 Outstanding Alumni Honoree Jacob Przybylski, committed to supporting the students who follow in his footsteps pursuing careers in STEM. Jacob developed an interest in aviation during his time at PVCC and went on to complete ground school and earn his wings. He wanted to share his passion of flying with others, so he trained and became certified as a flight instructor.

Highlights

- The Enrolled Agent Certificate of Completion prepares students to take the EA examination incorporating the use of current technologies, learning the basic rules of financial accounting, the legal, ethical, and social implications of business decisions, and the appropriate procedures to prepare taxes.
- The eight-week Amazon Web Services (AWS) program provides a detailed overview of cloud concepts, AWS core services, security, architecture, pricing, and support to help prepare students for the AWS Certified Cloud Practitioner exam.
- Partnering with Fresh Start Women's Foundation, PVCC is now offering a Small Business Start-Up Certification to meet the needs of women who wish to become entrepreneurs and start their own businesses.
- PVCC's Nursing program is well above the national average (86.53%) in passing score (Arizona state average,

- 89.2%). Approved by the Arizona State Board of Nursing and the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN), the program continues to prepare students with the fundamental skills necessary to be successful as a nurse assistant, licensed practical nurse (LPN), or as a registered nurse (RN) in a variety of acute, long-term, and community-based healthcare settings.
- Healthcare Technology Systems (HTS) is one of the fastest growing and in-demand career paths. PVCC's twoyear Associate of Applied Science degree enables students to jump into this growing industry quickly.
- Faculty Dr. Kishore Dash hosted The Innovation Challenge through the Entrepreneurship Education Center (EEC), providing guidance on creating a business pitch and the opportunity to present it. Participants learn how to take an idea from the drawing board to the board room.

Early College

In partnership with the Arizona Agribusiness and Equine Center, 18 students were **awarded a total of 22 AA/AS degrees** prior to high school graduation.

University Partnerships

Academic Excellence

- 41 student-athletes attained NJCAA
 Academic Achievement Honoree status
 (minimum 24 credits and 3.60 gpa).
- Eight teams attained NJCAA Academic Achievement Honoree status (minimum 3.00 cumulative team gpa)
- Approximately 30 student-athletes transferred to four-year institutions to further pursue their academic and/or athletic endeavors.

Highlights



Dance

- PVCC's talented students visited two local high schools to teach dance classes, as well as an elementary school where more than 100 sixth graders were taught Salsa steps.
- Presented "Personal Stories in Motion" in the spring dance collection featuring faculty, students, and guest dancers from Desert Dance Theatre.
- A \$6,444 Horizon Grant helped provide funds to bring in guest artists for PVCC students. The grant also enabled us to offer two free screen dance workshops for the surrounding community.

Music



- PVCC Music Industry Studies
 Graduate Sam Grundermann released
 her debut album Staytus Disease
 of the Mind, drawing heavily on her
 degrees in audio production, visual art,
 and sound design.
- Alice Cooper's Proof of the Pudding Music Competition was hosted by PVCC and featured several acts from PVCC's Music Industry Studies' program.
- PVCC's Science of Musical Instruments students learned from renowned pencil artist and Apache Violin maker Terril Goseyun the lost art of how to build an Apache Violin, which is made from the stalk of an agave plant. Students learned how to string their violins with horsehair.

Theatre

 Stage Combat is now a CCL offering, with nearly a dozen students in the midst of completing their certification.
 Students tested once virtually over zoom with Society of

- American Fight Directors' Fight Master Brian Byrnes and twice in person with Fight Masters Geoff Kent. All the students passed their skills proficiency tests and many gained recommended status (a gold star for excellence).
- The Center for Performing Arts packed the house with six fully mounted live productions, including one on the campus' outside amphitheater.
- Theatre once again traveled to local elementary schools to perform a play, Twisted Tales, created by the Theatre for Youth class, performing at eight elementary schools, as well as PVCC's Festival of Tales.
- Our theatre group was nominated for six AriZoni awards:
 Best Overall Production, Best Actress in a Major Role, Best
 Actor in a Major Role, Best Director of a Musical, Best
 Costume Design, and Best Media Design. We won an AriZoni
 award- Specialized Choreography Andrea Robertson for A
 Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder.
- The Tech Theatre Club initiated its growth this year under the guidance of Ryan Wentzel, PVCC technical director, who has helped to garner interest in the technical side of theatre, as well as help build their resumes as they prepare to go out into the industry.



Art

- Local artists, Dustin Lopez and Kaily Toney, designed and helped fabricate the "Water for Life" 108' long ceramic mosaic mural, which debuted in the PVCC amphitheater.
- PVCC student Valerie Frederick's artwork was selected for the MCCCD Artists of Promise District Art competition.
- PVCC Adjunct Photography Faculty George "Kip" Sudduth exhibited his paintings in the Union Hills' KSC hallway.
- The Ceramics Club hosted two charity events raising \$1,600 for the Puma Pantry.

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The Heart of Our Community

PVCC strives to be an asset to the communities we live and work in, creating strong allegiances that stretch far beyond our campus borders, nurturing community relationships and impacting our neighbors.



Highlights

- Festival of Tales made its return to campus for the first time since the pandemic. PVCC students, faculty and staff joined together with community members to host storytelling, arts and crafts, live music, dance and theater performances, games, book giveaways, food trucks, and much more.
- The International Film Festival made its return to in-person viewing, celebrating filmmaking on a global level.
- Since 2018, PVCC has been home to St. Mary's Food Bank's monthly food distribution drives

for students and the surrounding community, which became even more essential throughout the pandemic.

- PVCC continues to partner with Jackson Hewitt for free tax preparation and guidance for both the elderly community (AARP), as well as lowincome citizens (VITA).
- PVCC's Office of the President partnered with Arizona's Department of Child Services for its annual Holiday Giving Tree, successfully sponsoring three dozen children in foster care.

Giving Back

PVCC's Office of Strategic Partnerships (OSP) oversees corporate and community partnerships, alumni engagement programs, fundraising, and government relations to form strategic win-win partnerships that benefit our students and the community.

Our corporate, community, and governmental partners recognize that PVCC boasts impressive academic programs and that our students are top-tier talent and are essential for fueling the local economy. Our alumni represent a diverse group of talented individuals thriving in the labor market and driving positive change throughout the Valley.

Highlights

- The Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Engagement (DEIE) Committee coordinated a donation drive supporting The Sojourner Center, collecting much needed items to support the domestic violence shelter including diapers, bedding, and hygiene items.
- Named after PVCC Founding President Gina Kranitz, 15 PVCC students received scholarship awards.
- PVCC secured a Child Care Access Means Parents in School program (CCAMPIS) grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The four-year grant provides child care subsidy vouchers to eligible low-income, PVCC single-parent students, covering up to 75 percent of child care paid by students in regulated off-campus, partner, child care facilities.
- · Available around campus to help combat food insecurity, students can find Free Little Pantries containing various snack options. The program continues to expand and future plans include incorporating bagged groceries and recipes, encouraging students to take the items home and cook.
